## Your Opinion on Food Matters!

The Sunshine Coast Reginal District (SCRD) is currently assembling the major components of its Agricultural Area Plan for the Sunshine Coast.

The Plan is a strategy and policy framework to guide ongoing decision making about agriculture within the Sunshine Coast Regional District.

Expanding agriculture and food production is a key goal within the region. The SCRD's Sustainability Plan, We Envision, identifies developing an Agricultural Area Plan as an integral step to achieving local food security, and one of 13 major strategies for moving the region toward sustainability.

We Envision calls for increasing the amount of, and access to, locally grown and produced food. The sustainability plan also identifies the need to grow and diversify the regional economy, including stimulating the agriculture sector and localizing food production. To address this growing concern and initiate a regionwide dialogue about agriculture, the SCRD (including member municipalities the District of Sechelt and Town of Gibsons) is working on developing an Agricultural Area Plan under a 50/50 funding arrangement with the Investment Agriculture Foundation of BC, and its funding partners the BC Ministry of Agriculture, and Agri-Food Canada.



The Sunshine Coast Agricultural Area Plan provides an opportunity for the agricultural community, including local farmers, food processors and retailers, and other interested stakeholders within the community to work together to articulate a shared vision for the future of agriculture in the region and the steps needed to achieve this vision.

As part of Stages II and III of the Plan, Sunshine Coast citizens will have a number of opportunities to help develop and refine the Plan. Workshops and a speaker series are being planned for this Fall.


## Civic Addressing

The Property Information and Mapping Division of the Sunshine Coast Regional District maintains a formal civic addressing system for all Electoral Areas including the Town of Gibsons, the District of Sechelt, the Sechelt Indian Government District, and the Islands. Civic addresses are generally issued at the time of application for a building permit.

Emergency services can only help you if they can locate you. It is important that the location of your civic address sign allows emergency vehicles to find your driveway at night or in bad weather.

Below are some simple guidelines for displaying your civic address. These guidelines should be adjusted to suit the conditions of your property:

- Use a white background for the sign
- Include dark or reflective numbers
- Make sure that the numbers are at least 3 inches high
